STUDENT MAYOR(S)

19-A-016 COMMENTS FROM OUTGOING STUDENT MAYOR(S):

Jack Honka of Hyde Park Public School provided comments on his term as Student Mayor. He thanked Council for being so welcoming during his term and shared how he has learned a lot about what is required for the City to run smoothly. Jack also advised that he has gathered 70 signatures in support of a Splash Pad in the south end of Barrie.

Ryan Khosrovaneh of Eastview Secondary School thanked Council for the opportunity to be Student Mayor. He commented that he found it inspiring that Council had demonstrated such bold leadership on the issues before the City, such as the Opioid Crisis. Ryan shared that he learned a lot about municipal government and that by working cooperatively together, it is possible to make changes to make the community a better place to live.

19-A-017 SWEARING IN OF NEW STUDENT MAYOR(S):

Jeff Carswell, Deputy City Clerk called upon Mason Cooper, Portage View Public School and Matthew Crank, St. Monica's Catholic School to be sworn into office as Student Mayors. After being sworn into office, Mason and Matthew assumed their seats next to Mayor Lehman. Mayor Lehman introduced the members of City Council to Mason and Matthew. He noted that the members of City staff and representatives of the community's media were also in attendance.

Dr. Rebecca Van Iersel and Dr. Lisa Simon with the Simcoe Muskoka Health Unit provided a presentation concerning the Simcoe Muskoka Opioid Strategy. Dr. Van Iersel and Dr. Simon discussed slides concerning the following topics:

- The Foundational Pillar: Lived Experience;
- The Foundational Pillar: Data and Evaluation;

Members of Council asked several questions of the representatives of the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit and City staff and received responses.

DEPUTATION(S) ON COMMITTEE REPORTS

19-A-020 DEPUTATION BY MP, ALEX NUTTALL CONCERNING MOTION 19-G-049, ONGOING OPIOID OVERDOSE CRISIS IN CANADA

Mr. Alex Nuttall, Member of Parliament for Barrie, Springwater and Oro-Medonte provided a deputation in opposition to motion 19-G-049 concerning the Ongoing Opioid Overdose Crisis in Canada.

MP Nuttall advised that he was not against the intent of the motion, as he believed there should be a strong and consistent response to the public health emergency concerning the opioid overdose crisis. He advised that he believes that the first step should be the development of a plan and indicated his support for a public health emergency being called so there could be a coordinated effort to deal with the emergency. MP Nuttall discussed a legal opinion that indicated that the Mayor could declare a local emergency and the Provincial government is not required to endorse it. He also noted that the Legal opinion provided that the opioid crisis could be classified as an emergency, this matter could be within the jurisdiction of all three levels of government and that the onus is on the lower tier government to initiate an emergency with the other levels playing a supportive role.

He reiterated his comments that the City of Barrie is the most appropriate entity to declare the emergency as well as that he would not be opposed to the Provincial and Federal governments also declaring an emergency if City does. He advised that he had made a similar request in to the Federal Government in December, 2018.

MP Nuttall questioned what research has been completed concerning any existing funding streams that are available to assist with the opioid crisis and whether or not the City or the service delivery partners have made any applications to the programs.

MP Nuttall noted that he believes that a plan needs to be established to deal with the opioid crisis, that funding through existing programs should be applied for, that funding gaps be identified that would prevent any plan from being initiated and that a plan be implemented to address this epidemic.

MP Nuttall advised that he believes that if funding is requested without identifying specific parameters for use of the funding, it may result in funding not being received. He requested that the following amendments be made to the proposed motion:

 That staff be directed to look into all existing funding sources, to apply for all applicable funding opportunities and identify any funding gaps that affect the City of Barrie in combatting the opioid emergency and this be completed before making general requests for funding

- from the Provincial or Federal Governments without specificity; and
- That the requests for specific funding be directed to the appropriate Ministers.

In closing, MP Nuttall offered assistance and resources from his office to support the ongoing response to the opioid emergency.

Members of Council asked several questions of MP Nuttall and received responses.

LIZ SAUL PROVIDE AN EMERGENCY DEPUTATION IN OPPOSITION TO **MOTION** 19-G-049 CONCENRING ONGOING OPIOID **OVERDOES CRISIS** UPON A VOTE OF CITY COUNCIL BEING TAKEN, MS. SAUL CANADA. WAS PERMITTED TO ADDRESS CITY COUNCIL.

DEPUTATION BY LIZ SAUL REGARDING MOTION 19-G-049, ONGOING OPIOID OVERDOSE CRISIS IN CANADA

Ms. Liz Saul provided a deputation in opposition to motion 19-G-049 concerning the Ongoing Opioid Overdose Crisis in Canada, related to the portion of the motion that requests the Federal and Provincial funding to support, enhance, and expand evidence-based treatment and rehabilitation services, addiction prevention and education, and harm reduction measures.

Ms. Saul advised that she was the spokesperson for the Barrie Downtown Community Coalition that is a group of residents that live or own businesses in the downtown area. She expressed her concerns associated with what constitutes evidence based thinking and what areas of harm reduction are being referred to in the motion. Ms. Saul advised she is very concerned with the proposal for a Supervised Consumption Site in the downtown area. She commented that she feels that Council needs to acknowledge the concerns of the people and business owners that have observed the impact of the opioid crisis on the downtown.

Ms. Saul reviewed several concerns that she has related to a possible Supervised Consumption Site in the downtown area. She advised that she believes that there are many vulnerable populations in the downtown area such as seniors, low-income residents and people with disabilities and health challenges and she noted her concerns associated with the affect Supervised Consumption Site would have on the safety in this area.

Ms. Saul expressed her concerns about the overdose statistics and in particular those related to the downtown area. She also discussed the statistics attributed to the homeless residents to the downtown area.

Ms. Saul advised that she believes more information and site specific details are needed before the community can provide an educated opinion on the need for a Supervised Consumption Site and she indicated that she does not believe there is enough information to warrant a site to be located in the

downtown area. She noted that she believes there is insufficient research and information on the potential effect on surrounding businesses, homes and people, which should be considered. Ms. Saul provided her thoughts, concerns and observations on the Supervised Consumption Sites in other cities such as Vancouver, Calgary and Toronto and the potential impacts of a site being located in downtown Barrie.

In summary, Ms. Saul requested that the concerns she addressed, on behalf of the Barrie Downtown Community Coalition, be considered by Council.

A member of Council asked a question of Ms. Saul and received a response.

Ms. Attridge provided details associated with the location of her property in relationship to the proposed development. She advised that she in not opposed to the area being redeveloped, but she noted that she believes that the Special Provisions proposed for the site specific by-law should not be approved and she suggested that for the development the number of proposed units be reduced from 46 to 30 units. Ms. Attridge expressed her concerns associated with the impact that this the development will have on the established neighbourhood and the amount of public consultation that took place for this development. She advised that she does not believe that the applicant did as much as it could have to minimize the impacts on the neighboring property owners. Ms. Attridge further expressed her concerns with several other matters related to the proposal, including the impact on property values, ongoing noise and dust from construction activity, possible drainage problems, potential increase in noise and that the proposed vision for the whole area which was put forward by the developer and she noted that she felt that this vision should be put forth by City staff.
