


Community Food Security


A CONDITION IN WHICH ALL COMMUNITY RESIDENTS HAVE ACCESS TO A SAFE, CULTURALLY APPROPRIATE, NUTRITIONALLY ADEQUATE DIET THROUGH A SUSTAINABLE FOOD SYSTEM THAT MAXIMIZES COMMUNITY SELF-RELIANCE AND SOCIAL JUSTICE.

Household Food Insecurity Nationally

- 1 in 8 (1.8 million) Canadian households are food insecure
- 1 in 6 children (1.2 million) in Canada live in food insecure households
- 11.8% of couples with children under 18 were food-insecure, but this rate rose to 21.6% for male lone-parent households and 33.1% for female lone-parent households with children under 18.
- The highest rates of food insecurity were found among households where the respondent identified as Indigenous or Black, at 28.2%, and 28.9% respectively

Household Food Insecurity Provincially





After adjusting for other wellestablished social determinants of health, such as education and income levels, total annual health care costs in Ontario were: 121% higher for adults living in severely food insecure households than in food secure households

In Simcoe Muskoka 70,000 people or 1 in 8 households are struggling to put food on the table every year

This means people have to delay paying bills and rent and consider selling personal items in order to feed themselves or their family.

Senior living alone Old Age Security (OAS) + Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS)

Little or no money is left over for all other expenses (utilities, internet/phone transportation, clothes, school supplies and expenses, medical, vision and dental care, child care, personal care and toiletries, etc.)

Monthly cost to feed a family of four continues to rise

Household food insecurity means individuals and families do not have enough money to put food on their table.

From 2018 to 2019 the monthly cost to feed a family of four increased by about 8%. Over a five year period, the increase was about 14%.

The time to act is now

Spread the word:

- Talk about poverty and food insecurity with family, friends and others. Learn more and get involved.
- Share messages about poverty and food insecurity on social media.

Speak out for policies that:

- Increase social assistance rates to match real living costs, indexed to inflation.
- Support fair workplaces and good jobs with regular hours and benefits.
- Increase minimum wage.
- · Provide a basic income for all Ontarians.

Household Food Insecurity Simcoe County

- 11.4% of Simcoe residents are living in poverty
- 12% of the population aged 25 to 64 has no educational certificate, diploma, or degree
- Median employment income after tax is \$30,951 vs Ontario: \$33,946 (5% increase over 15 years)
- 17.8% Trades, transport & equipment operators & related occupations
- 24.5% Sales & service occupations (many part-time and seasonal)
- In 2016, 46,725 households or 25.8% were spending 30% or more of their household income on shelter costs.

What does this mean at a municipal level?

Assets

- Measuring and monitoring community food assets
- Leveraging existing resources and networks

Municipal Policies

- Annually reviewing the prevalence of household food insecurity and poverty in the area
- Investments in local infrastructure to help reduce poverty like affordable housing, affordable transit and active transportation
- Policy and program support for employment, training and entrepreneurship
