These assets allow the City to deliver services.


Asset management helps us make informed decisions to deliver services in a way that:

# What do we own & What is it worth?

Parks and Outdoor Recreation – Built Assets

Including playgrounds, sports fields and courts, trails and pathways, splash pads, skate parks, and other park assets such as utility infrastructure, lighting, fencing, and shoreline protection.

Natural Areas and Maintained Parkland

Green infrastructure assets such as woodlots, wetlands, trees, open space, natural and artificial ponds.




Supporting all services provided by the City and its service partners, including recreation centres, police and fire stations, theatres, libraries, and corporate facilities such as City Hall and the Operations Centre.










#### Parks & Outdoor Recreation – Age & Condition








#### **Levels of Service**

**Key Concept**: Current Levels of Service

This AMP focuses on the **current** levels of service being provided, and the needed investment to **maintain** them.

For 2025, the City will be required to report **proposed** levels of service, and the investment needed to **achieve** them.

83% FACILITIES IN FAIR OR BETTER CONDITION


75% PARKS & OUTDOOR REC IN FAIR OR BETTER CONDITION
